Coming soon: point, click, and sign up!



Library users will be able to register for adult Library programs online, sign up for email reminders about Library events, and download Library event information directly into their Microsoft Outlook calendars.

The new Library event calendar can be accessed at www.cslibrary.org. Hover over an event for more information and click on the event to sign up.

Click on "Email a friend" to send the program information on to someone you think would be interested in attending. Click on "Notify me" if you wish to receive email when other similar programs are scheduled. Click on "Download to calendar" to import the information into Microsoft Outlook.

Interested in booking the Community Room for your community or non-profit group? You can now submit a room request online as well. In

the Meeting Rooms and Display Spaces section of the library website, www.cslibrary.org/yourlibrary.html#meetingroom, click on "Reserve a room" to check a room's availability. A Library staff member will review your application and notify you if your room request has been approved. ♦

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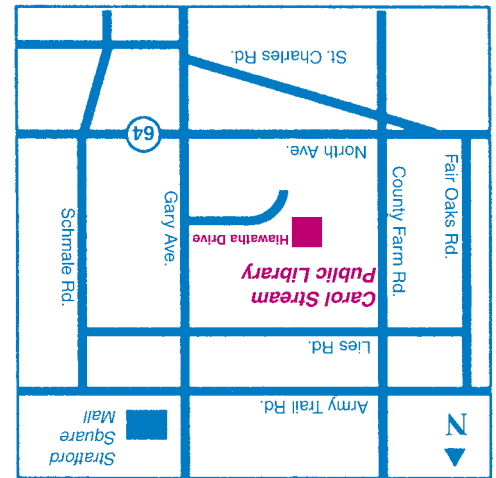
